## **Moseley Women**

Moseley has been home to many remarkable women over the years and there simply isn't room to do them all justice in this newsletter, so instead here are profiles of two remarkable ladies from very different fields:

## Dame Hilda Lloyd (Born Hilda Nora Shufflebotham)

Hilda Nora Shufflebotham was born in 1891 in Balsall Heath. Hilda went to King Edwards High School, before studying Medicine at the University of Birmingham. She qualified as a doctor in 1916 and soon became a consultant and senior surgeon at the Birmingham Maternity and Women's Hospitals, because with so many male doctors away in the war she was able to gain wide surgical experience rapidly.

In 1936 she pioneered the obstetrical 'flying squad', which saved the lives of many mothers and babies in Birmingham. In 1937 she was elected to the Fellowship of the Royal College of Obstetricians and Gynaecologists and became its president in 1949. She is the only woman to have held this title. She was made a Dame of the British Empire in 1951. She also held the position of Professor at the University of Birmingham for 11 years from 1943.

Hilda was married twice, first to Bertram Lloyd, also a Surgeon from Birmingham, who died in 1948. In 1949 she married Baron Theodore Rose, later moving to Ross on Wye to enjoy an early retirement. Hilda died in 1982 and is remembered fondly for her generosity, friendliness and contribution to women's medicine.

## **Daphne Slater**



Daphne Slater, born Daphne Allen in 1941, is a British Athlete, who competed mostly in the 100 metres. She attended Moseley Modern School where she was a sprinter and long-jumper. She trained with the Birchfield Harriers, the Birmingham club based at Alexander Stadium, and went on to compete in International championships between 1961 and 1966. In 1963 she became a world-record breaker when her team ran the 4 x 110 yard relay in 45.2 seconds to beat the USA at White City track in London. The pinnacle of her career was the 1964 Olympics where she won a Bronze Medal in the 4 x 100 metre relay with her team-mates Janet Simpson, Mary Rand and Dorothy Hyman. #### **IT Course**

The IT course was a fantastic opportunity for members of the Moseley Society Local History Group to improve their skills; including word processing, desktop publishing and the all too often dreaded spreadsheets! It was also a wonderful introduction to researching family history on the web; what information could be found on different sites and how much of it could be obtained for free. We also learned about conducting oral history interviews and the importance of doing so with professionalism and sensitivity. We also looked at the challenges of storage and conservation and gained a better understanding of how time-consuming ensuring that our archives are safe for the future really is. Some of the volunteers have offered to spend a couple of hours a week putting documents into acid-free storage or scanning items so that we have a digital record of them as well. If anyone else would like to assist in this process you are all very welcome; it's a great opportunity to have a peek into the depth and breadth of the collection.

All in all it was a very enjoyable and informative experience and we'd all like to thank Chris Sutton and Christine Mann for their hard work, patience and teaching skill. The course proved that no matter how much or little you know about computers, it is always possible to improve your knowledge and, perhaps more importantly, confidence! Some members of the Local History Group have also expressed an interest in more IT training and thanks to Ellie we have the details of some local providers (see below). Our members also stressed that one-to-one teaching at home would be the most effective way to learn, so if you have some IT knowledge to share and some free time we'd love you to volunteer!
