Working with schools

As part of our HLF funded project we worked with two local schools, Moseley Church of England and Park Hill Primary, assisting them with their study of Moseley.

Moseley C of E

It was "Heritage Week" at Moseley C of E and Janet Berry and Angela Barnbrook put together a terrific series of activities for the school. The diary ran like this:-

Monday 26th November: Year 4 Moseley at War - Year 5 Local Settlements - Year 6 The Dovecote The Year 4 class was "evacuated" to the Exchange. En route we met Rob Brown at St. Mary's Church where he showed us the damage done during the air raid and the war memorials. At the Exchange we took groups down into the air raid shelter (pictured) which still exists below the Post Office. Meanwhile in the Red Room we had dressing up in WW2 costumes, artefacts, an air raid shelter and some worksheets. It all went well and provided a varied and entertaining look at the war.

In the afternoon I gave a talk to Year 5 about how Moseley had been settled and expanded and the children did an exercise where they looked at old pictures and new pictures of Moseley and spotted the differences. Meanwhile over at the Dovecote Year 6 got a guided tour and talk about one of Moseley's most celebrated buildings.

Tuesday 27th November: Year 2 Moseley Buildings
Moseley has changed over the years but there is still
much that is familiar. The children went on a guided
tour of the village shops area and looked at images



from Moseley in the past. What has changed and what has not was the theme.

Tuesday 27th November: Year 1 Moseley Village Jobs



Several local shops agreed to be interviewed about their work and all were most gracious hosts. We gathered together for a break in the Exchange which is home to many workers who share the office space and where Gerald McAvoy was waiting to speak to the children about why he uses the Exchange and what he does.


Park Hill and the war

For the two Year Five classes at Park Hill we repeated the wartime exercises. While one class looked at the artefacts and costumes in class, the other went out to see St Mary's and the air raid shelter at the Exchange. The shelter hasn't changed too much since the war and still has ARP notices in place along with an air filter system and (to the children's delight) a secret escape route. The following week we swapped the exercises so each class got to experience both. Seeing the children trying on clothes and handling wartime items was a pleasure. There really is no substitute for actually touching the past!

"I am thrilled you did it all out of kindness and not out of money."
