He was the son of Robert Battiscombe Askquith-Ellis, assistant works manager at Wolseley Tool and Motor Car Co, and Clara Lepine Askquith-Ellis (née Alexander), of 30 Cotton Lane, Moseley, Birmingham.

William was the son of William Henry Brookes, a soldier, and Elizabeth Brookes; and husband of Emily Louise Brookes (née Portland, m 1906, St Martin's church), of 2 Coppice Road, Moseley, Birmingham.

Following the assault, the Germans retreated slowly south towards Falaise. The battle for Falaise itself began on 8.8.1944, the British army attacking from the south. James was killed during the assault. He is commemorated at Fontenay-le-Pesnel War Cemetery, Tessel, Normandy, France. James was the son of Ernest Bullock and his wife Clara (née Wragg) of 131 Alcester Road, Moseley, Birmingham and husband of Elfrida Agnes Bullock (nee Phillips, m 1931), of 12 Swanshurst Lane, Moseley.

The Armstrong Whitley V P5043 bomber he was piloting flew Into a hill near Lossiemouth when attempting to land with engine trouble during a night flying exercise. His navigator also died from his injuries, but two other crew members survived. Brian was buried at Birmingham Lodge Hill Cemetery. He was the son of Alfred Edward Cosham, and of Hilda May (née Chester, m Aston 1912), of 143A Alcester Road, Moseley, Birmingham.

Dare's Brewery Ltd, 207 Belgrade Road, Balsall Heath. He was captain of Moor Green F.C. and a member of Moseley Ashfield Cricket Club. From 24.9.1932 to 9.4.1938 he was a Special Constable attached to 'B' Division, Ladywood. He married Marie France Lucie Roxas-Elio from Tunisia. The married couple lived at Flat 36 Viceroy Close, on the Bristol Road. Edgar enlisted in RAFVR as an air gunner in 20 Operational Training Unit. Service Number 82976. He was killed in an accident during night time training in a Vickers Wellington bomber which stalled and crashed on the approach to Lossiemouth in bad weather when returning from an Air Firing Exercise. Three of the crew survived. He was buried at St. Peter's church, Dorsington, Stratford-on-Avon. He left a widow and young son, Michael John Dare, who was born on 1st September 1940, in Stratford on Avon.

He was the son of Oswald and Hilda Smith, of 98 Sandford Road, Moseley, Birmingham. Edward is commemorated on Runnymede memorial.

The regiment then saw service in the North African Campaign, fighting at the Second Battle of El Alamein whilst attached to the 2nd New Zealand Division. It was deployed to Italy in 1944, where it saw action in the Italian Campaign in June and July as part of 78 th Division. He was killed in the push north from Rome to Orvieto on Route 71 towards the Trasimene Line. Norman was the son of Thomas and Mary Smith (née Bennett), of Moseley, Birmingham. Norman is buried at Orvieto War Cemetery

He lived at 98 School Road, Moseley. He enlisted in the Royal Navy for long service, Service No. C/MX, based at Chatham. He served on <i>HMS Magic</i> , a Catherine class minesweeper launched in 1943. On 6 th July 1944 the ship came under attack from a German Neger, nicknamed a human torpedo, while protecting troops and supply ships off Normandy a month after D-Day. A Neger was a torpedo-carrying craft which could not submerge but was difficult to see during night operations. Forty Negers operated from Favrol Woods near Honfleur. HMS Magic sunk with the loss of 26 crew. George is commemorated on Chatham Naval Memorial.

After returning to flying duties, he was reported missing on his first operational flight. Dudley is buried at Rheinberg War Cemetery. He was the son of Cornelius Leslie Tallis, a butcher, and his wife Nellie May of Shirley, Birmingham formerly of 30 Woodbridge Road, Moseley.

Barry was born in 1923 to Howard John Thompson, the sales director of a time recording manufacturer, and his wife Hilda (née Sandbrook, m 1921). The family lived at 125 Anderton Park Road, Moseley. Barry enlisted in the RAFVR, Service No 1232209, in 1942 and was posted to North Battleford, Saskatchewan, Canada where he trained on a Fairchild Cornell II, a 2-seater trainer. In July 1943 he passed his course and was awarded his 'Wings'. He was then posted to 32 Elementary Flying School, Bowden, Alberta as a pilot instructor. Three months later, on 26 th October he overstressed the plane while performing unauthorised acrobatics on a dual instruction flight, causing the plane to break up and crash four miles southwest of Bowden.

Educated at Chigwell House School, Edgbaston then King Edward School, Stratford on Avon. He joined the Worcestershire Regiment in June 1939 and was gazetted Second Lieutenant in June 1940. Cyril was seconded to the RAF, Service No 117692, 501 Squadron and promoted to Flight Lieutenant on 21 st February 1942. He served with the Fighter Interception Development Unit with special

		responsibility for the night time interception of flying bombs. Cyril claimed six V1's destroyed although only details of four of them have been found. On 10 th March 1944, Cyril was awarded an MBE for this act of bravery on 21 st February 1943: In November, 1943, a Mosquito aircraft, carrying full operational equipment and long range petrol tanks, crashed whilst taking off and immediately burst into flames. Soon explosions were occurring almost continuously owing to fuel tanks, cannon shells and Verey cartridges being ignited. Blazing wreckage was being flung in all directions. Flying Officer Thornton, a pilot, was one of the first to arrive at the scene of the accident. Finding the navigator had been thrown clear, he made him comfortable, organised the medical party and supervised the injured airman's removal to the ambulance. Then, with complete disregard of his own safety, this officer made straight for the main area of the crash which was surrounded by barbed wire, and saw that the pilot of the aircraft was lying beside an engine with his clothing on fire. Flying Officer Thornton went through the wire into the middle of the wreckage to reach the pilot, and, in spite of the great danger he was in, put out the flames on the pilot's clothing, and removed his parachute. With assistance he then carried the pilot to an ambulance. Unfortunately, both the rescued airmen died later but had it not been for the prompt and gallant action of Flying Officer Thornton, who sustained burns to both his hands, neither would have been rescued alive. He was killed in an air accident on 21 st August 1944 due to bad weather and crashed his Hawker Tempest E1602/SD P near Woodnesborough, Kent. He is buried at Margate Cemetery, Kent. Cyril was the husband of Jean (née Boyd) whom he married in the Autumn of 1940. He was the son of the late Major Frank Brooking Thornton (d 1936), and Beatrice Louisa Thornton of 8, St. Georges Road, Edgbaston. In 1939 his mother Beatrice served in the Women's Voluntary Services Hospital Supplies.

On leaving school he attended the University of London and afterwards became an insurance broker with Messrs Winkle and Cooke Ltd, Colmore Row. He was commissioned in the Royal Sussex Regiment, 1 st Battalion, Service No. 153263. He served with the 8 th Army in North Africa but was invalided home. After recovering from his wounds he volunteered for service on the Normandy Front. He was attached to 9th Battalion Durham Light Infantry. He died from wounds received in action. He is buried at Bayeux War Cemetery. He was the son of the late Major Frank Brooking Thornton (d 1936), and Beatrice Louisa Thornton of 8, St. Georges Road, Edgbaston. In 1939 Beatrice served in Women's Voluntary Services Hospital Supplies.
Tracey	J R	St Agnes Church	11.4.1945	RAFVR	27	Flight Lieutenant John Robert Tracey. Service No. 62690, 605 Squadron. It was formed on 5 th October 1926 at RAF Castle Bromwich as a day bomber unit of the Auxiliary Air Force, recruiting in the Birmingham area. On 1 st January 1939, 605 Squadron was re-designated as a fighter squadron and initially re-equipped with Gloster Gladiators. The squadron moved to RAF B71 Coxyde air base, Belgium in March 1945 when it became operational. On 11 th April, John departed from Coxyde in a de Havilland Mosquito FB.Mk VI fighter-bomber on a night 'intruder' mission. The missions were intended to attack enemy fighters, airfields, radar and other infrastructure; stage diversionary attacks; and escort bombers. His plane came down en route to Berlin. John, who was piloting the plane, and his Flight Lieutenant were both killed and the plane irreparably damaged. John is buried in the Berlin 1939-45 War Cemetery.

He was an Officer cadet at the Royal Military College Sandhurst. John was posted to 4/7 Dragoon Guards, Service No. 128797 and gazetted Lieutenant a year later on 11.5.1940. He was posted to Italy, attached to 7 th Queens Own Hussars (QOH). In May 1944 the 7 th QOH joined the advance up Italy, seconded to the 2nd Polish Corps to capture the sea port of Ancona. There was heavy fighting during the crossing of the river Chienti between 21 st and 30 th June before the eventual hard fought eight hour battle for the port on 17/18 th July. John was killed a few days after the crossing of the Chienti river. He was buried in Ancona War Cemetery, Italy. He was the son of Dorothy Type (née Holmes) and the late Cedric Percy Type (d 1925) of 2, Oxford Road, Moseley, Birmingham.
Vaughan	N J	St Mary's Church	26.8.1943	Royal Engineers	26	Sapper Neville Joseph Vaughan. Service No. 1873636. Neville served with the 41 st Fortress Company, Royal Engineers in Singapore. In February 1942 he was reported missing in Malaya. The following year, the family received a postcard from Neville in July, to say that he was a Japanese POW but in good health. However, just weeks later, on 26 th August 1943, Neville died from beriberi. He is buried at Thanbyuzayat War Cemetery, Myanmar. The family lived at 82 Westfield Road, Kings Heath.
Wadsworth	A	St Mary's Church	14.10.1939	Royal Navy	16	Boy (First Class) Arthur Henry Wadsworth. Arthur lived at 43 Jutland Road, Kings Heath with his parents William Charles and Emily Clara (née Rostill) Wadsworth (m 1918). He was educated at Moseley National School and was a choir boy at St Mary's church, Moseley. On leaving school he joined his father at the Austin motor works. Arthur joined the crew on <i>HMS Royal Oak</i> on his 15 th birthday, Service No P/JX 158595. Shortly before midnight on 13th October 1939, Kapitanleutnant Günther Prien, commander of the German

						submarine U-47 evaded the supposedly secure defences of Scapa Flow targeting <i>HMS Royal Oak</i> . His first four torpedoes caused only minor damage. However, the next three caused a large hole in her side. The <i>Royal Oak</i> quickly began to roll over and then some cordite magazines caught fire. 386 men were rescued from the water but another 833 lost their lives. There was shock and grief, particularly over the large loss of boy-sailors. There had been 163 of them aboard the ship, some as young as 15. 126 went down with the <i>Royal Oak</i> . The U-boat captain was awarded the Knight's Cross, Germany's highest military award, and became a celebrity. Arthur is commemorated on Portsmouth Naval Memorial. This was not the only tragedy for the family. Two months after his son's death Corporal W Charles Wadsworth drowned when jumping in the river Severn at night to rescue a comrade. He was buried at Brandwood End Cemetery, Birmingham. Charles fought with the 5 th Worcester Regiment in the Great War taking part on 31 st October 1914 in the battle for Gheluvelt, Belgium, one of 375 men who stood between the Kaiser and the channel ports, for which he was awarded a Military Medal. In WW2, he joined 11 th Warwickshire Home Defence Battalion aged 47. He was described as a 'fine soldier and a splendid character'. Arthur's younger brother Lance Corporal Victor Charles Wadsworth served in the RAMC and survived the war.
Ward	J C	St Mary's Church	3.10.1941	RAFVR	21	Sergeant John Charles Ward was educated at Moseley Grammar School then Wycliffe College, Gloucestershire. He was a medical student at Birmingham University. He enlisted in the RAFVR 54 Squadron, Service No. 1165245. He was based at RAF Hornchurch, Essex, a Fighter Command Unit. In 1941 a new type of offensive, called a 'Circus' was designed to persuade the Germans to move their fighter units from internal German bases to the coast to replace their coastal Luftwaffe units that had been

						redeployed to cover the German army invasion of the Balkans and Russia in February and June that year. It was thought that this would enable more successful daylight penetration raids into Germany and France. The attacks involved small numbers of bombers escorted by several squadrons of fighters with the aim of bombing enemy airfields and supply dumps. Most of the bombers involved were Bristol Blenheims. John, piloting a Spitfire V, A type, was shot down by a Messerschmitt Bf109 ten miles off Manston, Kent while escorting Bristol Blenheims during Circus 105 on 3 rd October 1941. John's body was washed ashore eighteen days later on 21 st October. He is buried at The Hague General Cemetery, Netherlands. He was the son of Leonard, a manufacturing jeweller, and Rosina Ward, of 72 Reddings Road, Moseley, Birmingham.
Wilkins	NH	St Mary's Church	5.3.1940	Royal Regiment of Artillery	19	Second Lieutenant Nigel Hugh Wilkins. Nigel was born on 15 th June 1920. He was educated at King Edward's School Birmingham. He enlisted in 204/95 Anti-Aircraft (Warwick) Regiment, Royal Artillery, Service No. P/87325. In 1940 he was based at Longhope, near Scapa Flow, a heavy anti-aircraft camp. He died aboard <i>HMHS Amarapoora</i> , from cerebrospinal meningitis. The Hospital Ship was based at Scapa Flow and made regular trips to Glasgow to take the sick to local hospitals. Nigel was buried at Brandwood End Cemetery, Birmingham on 9 th March 1940. He was the son of Charles Stanley Wilkins (deceased, d 1926, aged 40) and Edith Florence Wilkins (née Dexter, m 1913) of 13 Grove Avenue, Moseley, Birmingham.

Williams	HL	St Mary's Church	29.9.1944	The Queen's Royal Regiment (West Surrey)	25	Sergeant Hugh Lovel Williams. Born on 4 th April 1919. He enlisted in the Queen's Royal Regiment (West Surrey) 2/7 th Battalion, Service No. 5113956. The 2/7 Battalion was sent to France in 1940 and were involved in the Battle of Dunkirk where they suffered heavy casualties due to the men having very little training. Two years later the 2/7 became part of the reformed 169th Infantry Brigade and fought in the North African Campaign with the 8 th Army, capturing Tunis in May 1943. Four months later the 8 th allied Army landed at Salerno. It was here that they took part in some of the bloodiest fighting in Italy. By 1 st September 1944 the German Army was retreating from Fogia, northwards in mountainous terrain. From thereon it was a gruelling ridge by ridge battle. It was in one such battle that Hugh lost his life. He is buried at Coriano Ridge War Cemetery, Italy. Hugh was the son of Albert George, a textile salesman, and Ada Harriet Williams (née Huggins), of 64 Woodthorpe Road, Kings Heath, Birmingham.
Young	J K	St Agnes Church	31.7.1941	RAFVR	18	Leading Aircraftman John Kenneth Young. John enlisted in the RAFVR, Service No. 1191569. He was based at 5 Flying Training School as a pilot under training. Piloting a two-seater Miles Master monoplane, an advanced trainer, he took off from RAF Peplow, Shropshire on a night training flight when he flew into a tree shortly after taking off due to the propellor being left in a 'course pitch' position in error. John was buried at Birmingham (Yardley) Cemetery. He was the son of David Charles, a postman, and Jessie Margaret Young, of 129 Sandford Road, Moseley, Birmingham.

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
