Newsletter Summer 2024

We hope you've been enjoying the months since we last met at the AGM.

Most of our newsletters start with a greeting and snapshot of the natural world to be found in Moseley. However, there's something else sprouting in the Neighbourhood – telegraph poles!

On May 20, wooden poles started appearing in Reddings Road, without installed by BRSK an warning, Alternative Network Provider (Altnet). It's part of a nationwide drive to increase broadband speeds. In urban areas broadband is normally brought to our homes via underground fibre connections. These poles support wires that deliver the broadband and are an alternative to underground cables. They are a cheaper and easier option for providers of high-speed broadband. Permitted Development Rights apply, which means the siting of poles do not require planning permission or prior approval from the Local Planning Authority (LPA). However, the operators are required to give the LPA 28 days notification



prior to installation and to notify, and consult with, residents affected. This is supposed to allow time to check that the installation is Permitted Development and suggest any reasonable conditions, especially details of siting in Conservation Areas and near Listed Buildings. There have been many complaints nationwide about BRSK's record especially its community engagement.

A member of our Planning group and resident of Reddings Road has been challenging BRSK about the inadequacies of their survey and lack of consultation, which has meant several poles having to be re-sited. Rural areas and areas without good broadband are supposed to be the priorities for this roll out, not roads with existing services. Also, installation should be underground where possible. She has also been to see our MP and is writing to Sir Chris Bryant, the Minister with responsibility for telecoms to ask for better scrutiny and accountability of this company under the relevant Act.

A different firm, Fibrecore, submitted planning notifications for a forest of poles that will go around the traffic lights in St Mary's Row, on the Green and by the wall of St Mary's Church – 21 locations in total. All these applications were quickly 'seen and noted by the Authority' despite the many issues raised by the Planning Group.



THE AGM

There were 27 members present. The AGM began at 8.15pm, following the visit of Douglas Wright, High Sheriff of the West Midlands, accompanied by a group of Police Cadets. Before the meeting the High Sheriff had been introduced to members of the Society and its Committee and to our Ward Councillors, representatives Moseley Community from Development Trust and some of the charities based at the Exchange, Moseley Forum, Moseley in Bloom, the Parish of Moseley and from the Interfaith group. He had made a brief presentation congratulating us on our community spirit and encouraging further Refreshments volunteering. were served before the meeting, allowing more time for people to meet the High Sheriff.

We'll be able to find out how effective all these actions have been.

THE DOVECOTE & ICEHOUSE

The dovecote garden is flourishing, edged by beautiful floral displays. We've welcomed many appreciative visitors to monthly open afternoons, Open Gardens, and an assessment visit for "It's Your Neighbourhood" by judge Paul Steed (results in September.) The team are particularly pleased to host Moseley in Bloom to use the dovecote garden for its Pop-up Plant sales. The next plant sale is due sometime in October.



Contractors at Moseley Hall Hospital have laid new paths through the previously very overgrown and never visited area by the hospital drive. This and other parts of the garden are providing scope and inspiration for new projects, so the garden is more than ever "work in progress" and a worthy challenge for our wonderful team of volunteers. at the ASC. Many thanks go to the ASC for the use of their room for the last ten years or so, but unfortunately the location there suffered from damp problems and limited accessibility. Their next challenge, which the Group has already embarked on, is to update and expand the catalogue to reflect the new storage locations and make it easier to trace the documents and artefacts we are searching for. 'Moseley Together' which is still running, was able to keep people in touch with what was happening during lockdown. Its purpose now is mainly to let us know what is happening at the Hive. For Lorna the Hive is a special place, a



wonderful community asset now owned by the CDT. People are so engaged, and it is amazing to see what the power of the community can achieve. It's the backing of the voluntary sector in Moseley as well as her wonderful team that, Lorna claims, has helped her achieve so much in her time at the CDT.
